

As I have already mentioned, ministry is very much shared in this parish as we seek to work collaboratively. Our whole ministry team take an active part in leading worship and enabling the church to be out in the community, to our clergy, Readers, Elders, leaders and preachers, thank you for the ministry you offer.

It has been a real joy to see the three curates develop and flourish in ministry and becoming much loved and respected ministers among us. Each bring their many gifts to our parish and it is a personal joy to have colleagues. Thank you, Ben, Claire and Phil for your vast contribution to the parish.

Doreen Page and Mark Bee continue on the training pathway, we look forward to seeing Mark ordained Deacon in June and Doreen licensed as Reader in September.

July saw us welcome Gillian Trinder to the parish on an extended placement, Gillian soon became part of the team and got involved in a variety of areas of ministry.

Many others are involved in the life of the church and add to the smooth running of church life, ensuring with the Churchwardens and Welcomers, that all is ready for Sunday worship.

Thank you to David Bunkell, Director of Music, and the choir who give a lead in both the hymns and the liturgical setting of the of communion at St Michael's. Thanks also to Pippa Bridges and the singing group who lead us in worship at St Luke's.

The Bell ringers welcome people to worship each week and it is good to see our band of ringers increasing. The flower arrangers, PCC members, cleaners, those who open and lock the churches each day and those who week by week serve refreshments: all part of a surprisingly large team that ensure we can be Church. It is not always easy, and it takes time and commitment, thank you all!

We have an amazing team of people who work with children and young people across a variety of groups and in our local schools, thank you to all involved in this area of ministry.

During the year we have seen much hard work for the various charities and organisations we support and generous giving to enable the mission and ministry of the Parish, and Diocese to happen. Thank you to all who give in time, money and energy. Thank you for so generously supporting what we do.

Gathering for social and fundraising events has been fruitful in terms of the connections made and the money raised. Thank you to the Social and fundraising team for delivering a variety of enjoyable events.

It has been good to see our commitment to be a Fairtrade parish develop, thanks go to Fran Tuck, Molly Martin, Margaret Page and Nicky Wilson for heading this up.

The Friends of St Michael's work tirelessly to support the ongoing maintenance and development of the building, thank you to all who make this possible and all who give their support.

Both of our buildings take a huge amount of time and effort to maintain and repair. Phil Filer oversees building projects at St Michael's, and we have the excitement in 2020 of seeing the fruit of many conversations and meetings become a reality with the completion of the reordering of the back of the church.

I am extremely grateful to John Bailey (St Michael's) and Ron Tuck (St Luke's) for the day to day repairs and maintenance they both carry out.

The end of 2019 saw me taking on additional roles; firstly, as Parish Priest for Worlingham, North Cove and Barnby. This felt like a natural connection for both of our benefices and from the first few weeks things are working well. There is much to develop together with our Cluster partners in Hundred River & Wainford. I was then invited by Bishop Martin to become the Rural Dean for Waveney & Blyth, I couldn't have taken on either of these additional roles without the support I have had from Beccles and the knowledge that we have a great team here.

I would like to add a very personal note of thanks to all of you for the love, support and encouragement you show to me as Rector and us as a family, your prayerful and practical support during 2019 has touched us deeply, thank you!

There is much that we as a church have to give thanks for and many ways in which we live out being church for Beccles. We are all called to play our part in the furtherance of God's Kingdom and that may be a more visible, or it may be just as importantly, a 'behind the scenes' role; both are equally valid and vital for a healthy church. It would be helpful to remind ourselves of Paul's words to the church in Corinth – '*...there should be no division in the body, but that its parts should have equal concern for each other.*' (1 Corinthians 12:25)

One of the exciting things about being a Christian is that our God is a God of surprises as well as being faithful and just. Just when all things appear to be calm God offers His church opportunities for service in ways that we haven't even thought about. The excitement in that is joining in God's mission even if that feels scary – because we can be assured He will equip us through His Holy Spirit. *Now you are the body of Christ, and **each one of you is a part of it.*** (1 Corinthians 12:27)

Treasurers Report 2019

2019 has certainly been a very encouraging year for the Parish.

Income - Regular giving has increased this year to £90,532.00 - in comparison with just over £81,975.60 during 2018. What a magnificent amount, I must say a big thank you to you all for your tremendous support. Your generosity is appreciated by everyone and my grateful thanks goes to everyone who have given, whether large or small amounts. All gifts are important in supporting the parish during 2019 for both St Michael's and St Luke's Churches. Without your gifts the Parish would not be in the position that it is in now.

I must also offer my appreciation to John Bailey who over the course of 2019 has applied for and secured several grants which has enabled work to commence on The Servedy at St Michael's.

Rental income has increased by £954 from 2018 which shows that by utilising the facilities we have, we can generate a good income.

Expenditure - Wage & Service costs have increased from 2018 but all other expenditure has been in line or reduced from 2018. We have tried to keep costs to a minimum and I am delighted that we have managed to achieve this for three years running. Overall our expenditure is down from 2018.

Despite pressures faced by so many, funds continue to be raised to help maintain both St Michael's and St Luke's Churches. We must all be very grateful to those who have helped raise funds for the parish and also to everyone who has supported the churches in any way.

Our Parish Share requested by the Diocese was £66,553, and am delighted to report that this was paid in full. Our Share figure for 2020 is £69,512.

My thanks are due to the team of people who helped administer parish finances, they are in particular -

Roger Bennett who accounts for and banks monies received at St Luke's.

Doreen Page who accounts for and banks monies received at St Michael's.

I would also like to say a big thank you to Doreen for assisting me in my role as Parish Treasurer. This support has helped me enormously.

Rich Henderson for his guidance and support.

We all knew we would face some challenges in 2019, but the results we have achieved with your generous financial support is amazing.

I thank each and everyone of you.

St Michael's Churchwardens' report

St Michael's Wardens Patrick Burke and Ian Hollingsworth have been active in ensuring that St Michael's continues to be a well looked after building, safe for all who enjoy worshipping in the church as well as all who enjoy coming to the building for other activities.

Together as a church family we have been pleased to see our 3 curates ordained as Priests and joining with Rector Rich as a fully fledged team helping with leading worship.

As always it has been good at times to see St Michael's filled to capacity especially with children and young people for some events as well as with families, young and not so young for others.

During the year we have managed to have the bulbs changed in the Memorial Chapel. One difficulty with such a tall building is replacing light bulbs. However we were kindly loaned a light weight scaffold tower to enable safe access to the lights, most of which are placed at roof level. This enabled us to change all the bulbs in that area at one time. We have also made a start on replacing bulbs in the Chandeliers in the Nave as well as cleaning and testing the overhead heaters that have been in place for several years.

We are grateful to Robert for keeping our churchyard grass cut short and to the volunteers who help tend the flowerbeds and prune some of our fast growing shrubs.

We are looking forward to seeing work in the Nave, both started and completed, that we have been planning for during the past year. This will include some changes at the West end of the building. These changes should enable a wide variety of activities to be staged in the church building.

St Luke's Churchwardens' Report

It has been another busy year at St. Luke's with the building used to almost full capacity.

Thanks to the generous donations given in memory of Dianna Chaston we now have a new small communion table in the quiet prayer area of the church.

We have been encouraged by the support we have received since the launch of our Fair Trade agency in October, having sold around £600 worth of goods. Goods are on show and available after each Communion Service at both churches, and catalogues available for orders. This is solely to raise awareness of Fair Trade, and is not for profit.

We enjoyed a joint Christingle Service with Worlingham Church, also joined by several Beavers and their leaders as they had a sleep over the previous night. We are looking forward to a growing relationship with the Worlingham group of churches.

After the total breakdown of the hood sterilizer we have secured funding for a new one, and fitting costs, from Beccles Townlands Trust.

Looking forward to 2020 we are hoping to secure funding to have the outside grass area landscaped and fenced, and have already had plans drawn up by Covered in Green. The cost will be around £22,000. The car parking area is also in a very poor condition, needing levelling and resurfacing.

St. Luke's Toddler Group

St. Luke's toddler group has continued to flourish thanks to the enthusiastic, faithful commitment of its voluntary helpers. 30 - 40 adults and children attend on a quiet week, and between 60 and 70 contribute to a very lively morning during a busy session. We bid a sad farewell to a significant number of 3/4 year olds and

their parents/carers in the summer; most of them had regularly supported the group since the children were babies. However, since September, we have welcomed a new influx of new babies and mums.

The group offers its usual mix of a safe environment for the babies/toddlers to enjoy play along with an opportunity for parents/carers to relax and chat over a cup of tea or coffee.

Along with the usual toys, books, and playdough; since September the group has provided simple craft activities which have been very popular. We have also been able to buy some simple musical instruments, creating a welcome focus for our song-time and nursery rhymes.

As always, we finished the year with our Christmas celebration, including a much anticipated visit from Father Christmas. Over 80 adults and children enjoyed playing, chatting, eating Christmas goodies and singing Christmas songs before heading home with their Christmas gift.

Several families have this year extended their involvement in the life of St. Luke's by participating in the Family Messy Church mornings at Easter and in the summer, along with the monthly Sunday Messy Church services.

Mission Focus 2019

At regular times of year our Mission Focus services turn our attention to the many different individuals and organisations which we support across the world. Our Christingle and January services provided an opportunity to support our local Children's Society shop and the wider work of the Society. In March we focussed on strengthening our support for our diocesan link with Kagera, one of the poorest areas of Tanzania. Our support for Christian Aid Week in May is also an excellent opportunity to link our fund raising activities with those of other churches in Beccles. July is the month when we especially concentrated on our support for the Church Mission Society and particularly for our Link Mission Partner, Catherine Lee, in Taiwan and also for Rachel Ullmer in Pakistan. Not forgetting Margaret Birch, a member of St Michael's working in Mozambique. Our Regular Harvest festival Appeal for John and Alice in Rukungiri has continued to strengthen our links with Rukungiri Primary School and the Farmland Trust. Finally, in November we renewed our financial support for the work of the Bible Society.

Every three months we produce a new edition of the Prayer Diary which highlights special prayer points for all these individuals and organisations.

The community bus is no longer available for use by Lunch club, but we are hoping to get a permit which will allow us to use the May bus. All three of our drivers are able and willing to drive it for both the May Centre and Lunch Club.

As ever, we are very grateful to all who work so hard to keep the lunches supplied each week, and to Duncan as chef, and Duncan and Wendy who do the shopping and plan menus.

Foodbank 2019

During the past year the demand for food has increased to a much higher level. We have seen many more young families coming to the foodbank, as well as single people. At the end of a session we frequently find we have an empty cupboard. As well as food, we have given out lots of extras this year, including toiletries and pet foods. Over Christmas, thanks to our delivery team, we gave out 20+ Christmas boxes plus; toys, and warm clothing, such as hats gloves and socks. All these were very gratefully and often tearfully received. This year several of our regular lonely clients enjoyed the Christmas lunch and fellowship at the church. The Waveney Foodbank, of which we are a part, has grown so much that our present warehouse in Diss cannot cope with the demand. So we are delighted that another extra warehouse has been found, near to Beccles. This will help us to keep up with the demand. This is due to open in February. We have had several new volunteers this year, and they have added to our already reliable and cheerfully busy band. In November we braved a very chilly three days at Tesco Stores for our annual collection too. The volunteers were given a thank you lunch in the autumn together with the Halesworth volunteers. This gave us all a chance to chat and get to know one another better.

A vital part of our work is also to spend time sitting over a cuppa with our visitors, and to listen to them. We can be the only people they speak to, and we are then able to point them in the direction of extra help where necessary. All this is only possible because of the generous support we receive from you, through your donations which are needed not only at this time of year, but all year through. We value your continuing support and prayers.
